J. DEREK BOOTH retired, in 2000, from the Department of Geography at Bishop's University after thirty-one years of service. He has taught a wide range of courses including "Landscape and Historical Geography of the Eastern Townships." He has also published the two-volume *History of Railways in Southern Quebec*. He is a former member of the *Table de la concertation* for the allocation of funds for the *ministère de la Culture et des Communications*'s program of Church restoration in the Townships. Dr. Booth is active as a member of the Board of Directors of the ETRC, of which he is currently Chair.

KATIE PICKLES is Senior Lecturer in History at the University of Canterbury in Christchurch, New Zealand. In 1996 she completed a PhD in Geography at McGill University, now in

She has written nearly two dozen journal articles and book chapters, and is the editor of *Hall of Fame: Life Stories of New Zealand Women* (Christchurch, 1998), and the co-editor with Lyndon Fraser of *Shifting Centres: Women and Migration in New Zealand History* (Dunedin, 2002). She is currently co-editing a collection of essays titled *Embodied Contacts: Women in Canada's Colonial Past*, and writing a monograph about memory, colonial identity and the martyrdom of Nurse Edith Cavell.
